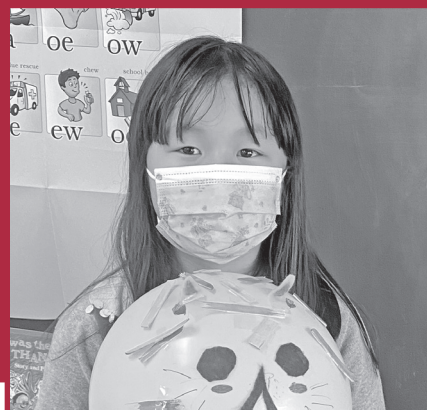

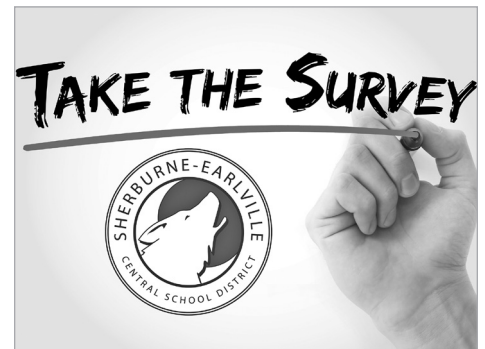
S-E bands perform at All-County!

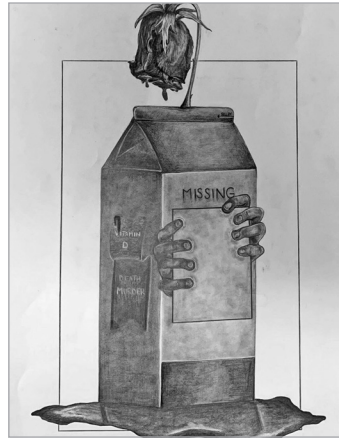

All six of our OM teams – including this group of first-time regional participants – advanced to the State Tournament on March 26 at the New York State Fairgrounds!

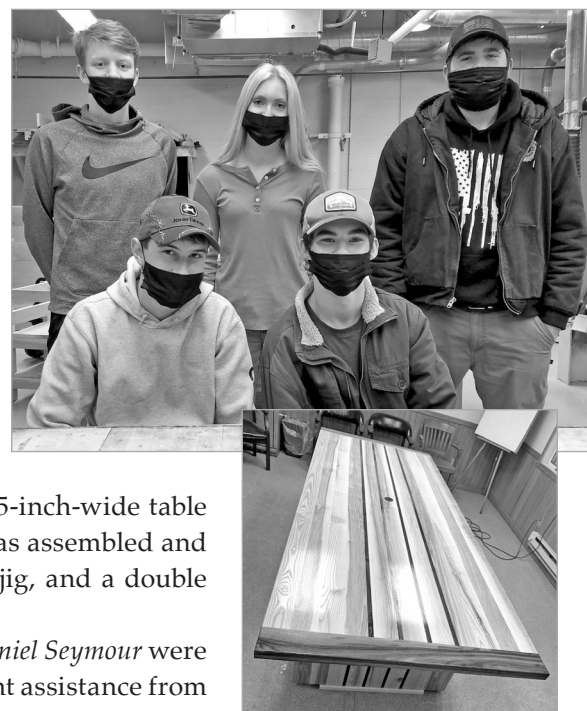
S-E technology students give back!

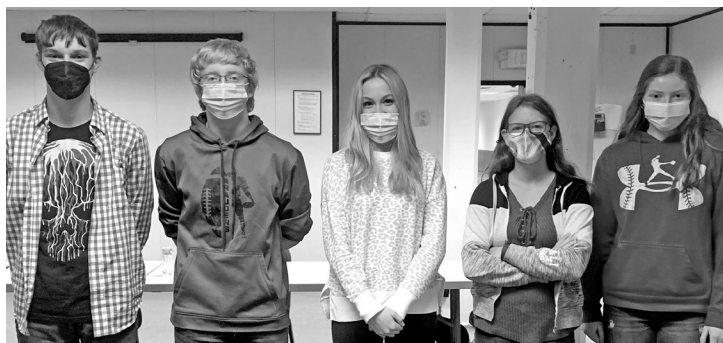
Sherburne-Earlville senior *Gavin Zbicki* recently led a group of his peers in a giveback project for Baillie Lumber, which has supported the district's Technology program with countless lumber donations over the years.

Baillie's generosity has allowed our students to design, build, and take home woods-based projects at no charge. The process starts at the ninth-grade level in our Drawing and Design for Production course and, for those with a genuine interest, continues with independent studies.

Baillie Lumber recently moved one of its many operations to Sherburne, so *Gavin* started an independent-study project to design and construct a conference table for its new office space. The 9-foot-long, 45-inch-wide table made from White Ash and Black Walnut (all from Baillie's, of course) was assembled and finished on site and required several glue-ups, the use of a doweling jig, and a double wedge tusk tenon.

Classmates *Jacob Jones*, *Brooklyn Babcock*, *Taylor Grzymkowski* and *Nathaniel Seymour* were actively engaged in *Gavin's* giveback project, which also received frequent assistance from junior *Gavin Egerer*.

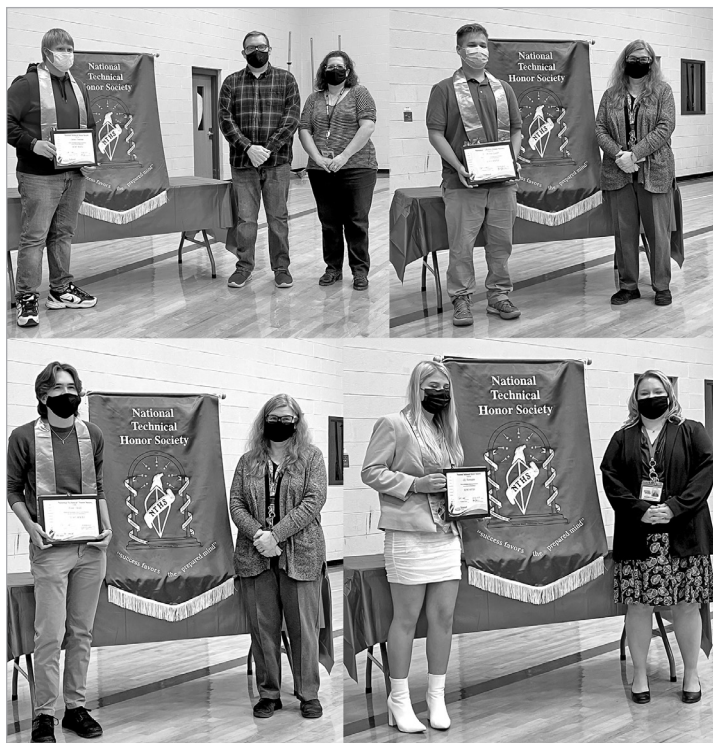

Excellent Work!

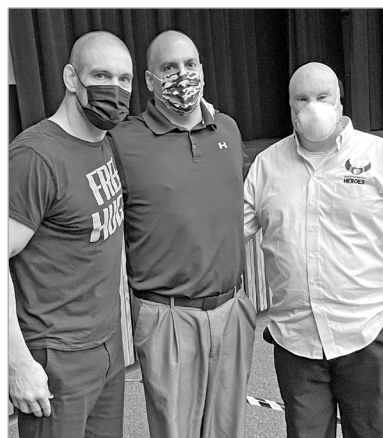
Congratulations to our very own Carrie Fern, a 2021 recipient of the Judith A. Martens Secretarial Award of Excellence!

Sherburne-Earlville Elementary School will hold open registration days in April for students who will be in Universal Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten during the 2022-2023 school year.
