COMMUNITY

The town of Sherburne and the nearby village of Earlville make up a rural community of about 4,000 people. This township is located 12 miles north of Norwich and 10 miles south of Hamilton along route 12.

The school district consists of: One K-5 building and One High School/Middle School 6-12 building.

Athletic Program

Sherburne-Earlville provides a wide range of athletic programs for students at all grade levels. These include football, track (indoor & outdoor), field hockey, soccer, basketball, golf, volleyball, swimming, wrestling, cross country, softball, baseball, color guard, cheerleading, and bowling.

Curriculum

Sherburne-Earlville High School provides a comprehensive curriculum offering Local, Regents, and Advanced Designation Regents Diplomas. Advanced Placement courses are offered in English, U.S. History, European History, Economics, Biology, Calculus AB, Studio Art, and Psychology. Students are able to earn numerous college credits through Morrisville College and Tompkins Cortland Community College. Classes are also available for eligible students at nearby Colgate University with appropriate arrangements between the university and the school system. Delaware-Chenango-Madison-Otsego BOCES, the area vocational center, offers a variety of programs for our juniors and seniors. These include Auto Collision & Refinishing, Auto Technology, Carpentry & Building Construction, Early Childhood Education, Culinary Arts, Cosmetology, Certified Nursing Assisting, Networking/Computer Tech, Visual Comm/Graphic Design, Human Services, Security & Law Enforcement, Conservation & Equipment Tech, and Welding. In addition, the center offers New Vision Programs in Health Occupations and Law & Government to select seniors by application.

Graduation Requirements:

Twenty-two high school credits are required for an Advanced Designation Regents Diploma, as follows:

English.....	4.0
Social Studies.....	4.0
Mathematics.....	3.0
Science.....	3.0
Foreign Language.....	3.0
Health.....	0.5
Music/Art.....	1.0
Physical Education.....	2.0
Community Service.....	15 hours

The remaining credits required are taken as electives chosen from the departments of Art, Music, Foreign Language, English, Social Studies, Science, Mathematics, Business, Technology, Agriculture, Computers, and Occupational Education.

Students seeking an Advanced Designation Regents Diploma must also pass the following exams:

- English/Language Arts Regents
- U.S. History Regents
- Global Studies Regents
- Foreign Language Proficiency
- Algebra Regents

- Geometry Regents
- Algebra II Regents
- One Physical Science Regents
- One Life Science Regents

* Students who have a cumulative average of 90 or higher on the above Regents Exams will receive an Advanced Designation Regents Diploma with Honors.

Requirements for a regular Regents or Local Diploma are the same except that only one credit of Foreign Language is needed and the following Five Regents Exams are required:

- English/Language Arts
- One Social Studies
- One Mathematics
- One Science
- One additional either Math, Science, Social studies, or approved pathway

* Special Education Students who meet the compensatory option or score between 55 and 64 on the above Regents Exams will receive a Local Diploma.

Grading & Class Rank

Sherburne-Earlville is on a numeric grading scale with a passing grade being 65 or above. Class rank is computed from final grades in all courses. All AP Courses are given a weight of 1.1 and Honors/Accelerate and college courses are weighted 1.05 at Sherburne-Earlville.
