

We developed our budget with fiscal responsibility in mind and to provide our students with the academics, programs and opportunities they need to become the best version of themselves. 


High School senior Calib Hill took an oath this past February to join the U.S. Army!

The Colorscape Chenango Arts Festival Board of Directors selected Riley's piece as the winning entry for its *Art Can Change the World* Billboard Challenge in May.



S-E High School among best in region

Congratulations to Sherburne-Earlville High School, the second-highest ranked high school in the DCMO BOCES region, according to the 2019 *U.S. News & World Report*.

Led by Principal Nicholas Colosi and Assistant Principal Jamie Maistros, SEHS ranked 367 out of 1,290 New York high schools and 4,380 out of more than 23,000 nationally. Only Bainbridge-Guilford ranked higher than SEHS among DCMO BOCES' component districts, at 262 in the state and 3,014 in the country.

DCMO BOCES is a regional educational agency that provides services in partnership with 16 local school districts. Other DCMO BOCES component districts are Afton, Delaware Academy, Downsville, Franklin, Gilbertsville-Mount Upton, Greene, Hancock, Norwich, Otselic Valley, Oxford, Sidney, Unadilla Valley, Unatego and Walton.

The *U.S. News & World Report* annually ranks high schools based on their performance on state-required tests, graduation and how well they prepare students for college. **&**

Students flock to MakerSpace

MakerSpace is making progress at Sherburne-Earlville Elementary School.

After drawing some interest in its inaugural academic year (2017-18), every student in grades 3-5 has made it to Robert Fenton's MakerSpace room on the second level of the SEES building this year.

Defined by a green wall that doubles as a green screen for video creations, the MakerSpace room encourages exploration, creation and sharing through STEM projects (Science, Technology, Engineering Math). Students are encouraged to add personality and color to their creations, such as the one in this YouTube video (https://youtu.be/sruqmOvgIhQ).

Students have participated in several other projects during the 2018-2019 academic year, exploring kinetic/potential energy with rubber-band race cars; airplane flight and lift with stunt/long-distance airplanes made of paper; and thrust, trajectory and angles with homemade catapults.

Thanks to Chromebooks distributed by the district this year, MakerSpace doubled as the Coding Café from time to time. Students had a chance to use a coding program called Scratch to create video games and screensavers to share with the class.

Kids also worked with LittleBits, which are small, magnetic, connectable circuit boards, to discover how circuits work. They made digital thermometers, LEGO houses with working lights/doorbells and bubble blowers, among other items that feature circuit boards.

SEES also complemented its Science unit on structures with a Platform Competition. Students received \$15



to purchase specific supplies needed to make a weight-bearing platform. Using only craft sticks, masking tape, clips and rubber bands, our kids designed some amazing platforms; one even held more than 6,000 grams!

Olivia averaged 238 at the CSC event, rolling the high game (261) and the high series (714). Olivia, who also had

the highest game (260) and series (680) in the CSC this past season, averaged 186 overall. She joined **Dalaney** (166) and **Jade** (123) on the CSC All-Star Team, which included honorable mentions **Alexis** and **Sierrah**.


VOLLEYBALL

S-E to honor first Athletic Hall of Fame class

A standout runner, a prolific basketball scorer and two cross country teams will be honored during the first Sherburne-Earlville Athletic Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony on June 18.

Sherburne-Earlville's inaugural Athletic Hall of Fame class features former Section 4 champion runner Rob Baker (Class of 1987), former boys basketball star Bob White (Class of 1972), and S-E's 1989 and 1990 Class C-D state champion boys cross country teams.

Inductees will be honored at 6:00 p.m. June 18 in the S-E Middle School/High School Auditorium. S-E's Athletic Awards Night for students will follow the Induction Ceremony.

Future Athletic Hall of Fame inductions will take place every other year, meaning the next class will be honored in 2021. The Sherburne-Earlville Central School District will induct its next Wall of Fame class in 2020 and ensuing even-numbered years.

CLASS OF 2019

Rob Baker

Sherburne-Earlville's Rob Baker won Section 4 titles in consecutive academic years, taking the Class C 3,200-meter run crown in 1985-86 and the overall sectional 3,200 championship in 1986-87.

Rob closed his senior season as Sherburne-Earlville's Athlete of the Year in 1987, following a 10th-place finish in the 3,200 at the state meet.

Also a bronze-medal winner in the 1986 Empire State Games, Rob went on to compete in cross country, indoor track and field and outdoor track and field for the United States Naval Academy.

Bob White

Sherburne-Earlville's Bob White was tough to stop on the basketball court during an era marked by major events in American history.

Bob started his scoring tear in 1969, the same year Richard Nixon became our president, Neil Armstrong took the first steps on the moon, and some of the top rock musicians in the world came together for Woodstock.

By the end of his senior season in 1972, Bob had amassed 1,626 varsity boys basketball points, which still stands as the second-highest total in Chenango County history.

1989-1990 Boys Cross Country

Sherburne-Earlville's 1989 boys cross country team won Susquenango League, Section 4 Class C-D and New York State Public High School Athletic Association Class C-D championships.

Coached by LeRoy Hodge and Bob Marano, the team featured studentathletes Shane DuBois, Tim French, Paul Johnston, Aaron Jones, Paul Jones, Shane Kellogg and Matt LoPiccolo.

Joe Kmetz joined the squad in 1990 and helped S-E to the same string of championships en route to a fourthplace finish in the Federation meet.

Two S-E seniors win track titles



Congratulations to Sherburne-Earlville seniors Amberlyn Robertson and Owen Rodriguez, who won championships May 23 during the Section 3 Class B2 Track and Field Meet at Canastota High School.

Amberlyn took two events, placing first in the 200-meter run in 26.38 seconds and finishing on top in the 400-meter run in 58.99 seconds. She was the only girl to beat the 1-minute mark in the 400.

Owen's title came in the 400 hurdles, crossing in 57.07 seconds to win by more than two seconds. Owen also placed fourth in the 100 hurdles (16.37) and sixth in the long jump (18 feet, 11.5 inches).

Eighth-grader Lily Stoddard contributed a second in the girls discus (103-6), finishing just three inches behind Cazenovia junior Claire Edwards.



Important S-E sports information!

Interscholastic sport participation is available to all Sherburne-Earlville Central School District students in grades 7-12. Participation by a student in athletics involves a certain degree of physical risk or injury. All athletes must be medically cleared before the beginning of practice each season.

The following summarizes our requirements:

Physical exam: Completed by the student's primary care provider or the school health care provider. This is valid for a period of 12 continuous months from the date of the exam and must be accompanied by a signed and completed Health History form. A copy of the exam must be on file in the Health Office.

Accident reports: Should a student-athlete sustain an injury during participation of the sport, an accident report must be completed. Students must notify the coach when an injury occurs. If a health care provider removes the athlete from participation due to an illness/injury, the student must submit a written note from the health care provider. Likewise, once the student is able to return, a written release must be obtained from the health care provider and submitted to the school's Health Office.

Concussions: All students participating in a contact/collision/impact sport must take the concussion baseline test. The student and a parent are required to sign the written consent

form to participate in the concussion management program. This is offered to sixth-graders this spring.

Rescue medication: Students requiring "rescue" medication (e.g. Albuterol, EpiPen, etc.) must provide the medication in its original, labeled container and submit written permission from a parent/guardian and a health care provider.

Family ID: Sports registration is done through an online program called Family ID, which keeps track of your student's information. Registration opens 30 days before the first day of a sport's practice. For instructions, registration or more information, visit https://www.secsd.org/FamilyIDInstructions.aspx online (Athletics > Family ID Instructions). Registered students will be contacted by their coaches before the start of the season.

Permission forms: Health Appraisal, Health History, Medication Authorization and ImPACT permission forms are available online at https://www.secsd.org/HSMSHealthOffice.aspx (Departments > Health Office > Middle and High School Office).

Important: Students will not be permitted to practice until all required forms and the Family ID registration have been submitted. For more information, School Nurse Kathy Steward at 674-7314 or Athletic Director Brad Perry at 674-8433. ❖

Measles information you may want to know!

Due to the current increase in measles cases in the United States, below is some information that may be helpful:

Measles is an acute viral illness characterized by a prior fever, cough, coryza (cold symptoms), and conjunctivitis, followed by a maculopapular (red bumps on red skin) rash. The rash spreads from the head to trunk to the lower extremities. Measles is usually a mild or moderately severe illness; however, measles can result in complications such as pneumonia, encephalitis, and death. Most adults in the U.S. are at low risk for measles.

From January 1 to May 10, 2019, 839 cases were reported the CDC. Even in previously healthy children, measles can cause serious illness requiring hospitalization.

- One out of every 1,000 measles cases will develop acute encephalitis, which often results in permanent brain damage.
- One or two out of every 1,000 children who become infected with measles will die from respiratory and neurologic complications.
- Subacute sclerosing panencephalitis (SSPE) is a rare, but fatal degenerative disease of the central nervous system characterized by behavioral and intellectual deterioration and seizures that generally develop 7-10 years after measles infection.

Certain adults (age > 18) are considered to be at high risk for either acquiring measles and/or transmitting disease to vulnerable persons. (Vulnerable persons are infants,

poorly nourished young children, or those with weakened immune systems-HIV/AIDS).

High risk adults include:

- Students at post-high school educational institutions
- Healthcare personnel
- International travelers to any country outside the United States

High-risk adults need written documentation of two doses of MMR vaccine (each dose separated by at least 28 days), or other evidence of immunity.

Other presumptive evidence of measles immunity includes:

- Birth before 1957
- Laboratory evidence of immunity
- Laboratory confirmation of disease

Healthcare facilities should consider vaccination of healthcare personnel born before 1957 with two doses of MMR who lack laboratory evidence of immunity or laboratory confirmation of disease.

If a person's measles immunity is unknown, providers should vaccinate with MMR, unless there are contraindications.

Routine measles vaccination for children is a key public health strategy to reduce measles deaths. The measles vaccine has been in use for over 50 years. It is safe, effective and inexpensive. It costs approximately one US dollar to immunize a child against measles.

STAR changes may adversely affect homeowners



Changes in this year's New York State budget may cause some homeowners to lose their School Tax Relief (STAR) Exemption, depending on the taxpayer's income level. Beginning this year, the income limit for the Basic STAR exemption is now \$250,000. The state Department of Taxation and Finance is sending letters to homeowners affected by this change to notify them they will automatically be registered for the STAR credit, as long as the State can verify income. If the income cannot be verified the letter sent will ask for more information from the property owner in order to become registered for the Star Credit.

Until now, all homeowners with incomes under \$500,000 were eligible to receive a STAR exemption. Under Gov. Andrew Cuomo's new state budget, homeowners will continue to receive the exemption as long as their annual household income is less than \$250,000.

"Property taxpayers should be extra vigilant this year to insure they do not lose out on their eligibility for STAR benefits due to all the changes the Governor has implemented to the program to shift STAR from a property tax reduction on your school taxes to a tax credit check you receive in the mail," stated Michael J. Borges, executive director of the Association of School Business Officials of New York.

Switching from an exemption to a credit affects those whose taxes are paid through an escrow account. An exemption versus a tax credit will affect the homeowner's monthly escrow payment amount.

"It's important for taxpayers who are being removed from this exemption to contact their escrow companies," Rochelle Harris, president of the New York State Assessors Association, said. "This action could adversely affect property owners who aren't prepared for this change."
