

Superintendent's Message

The best is yet to come!



We hope you're enjoying the summer following another great school year, which officially closed with our Class of 2024 Graduation Ceremony.

Families and friends packed the bleachers June 28 at Colgate University to help us celebrate the amazing accomplishments of our Class of 2024, which graduated together on a picture-perfect summer evening. We were particularly impressed by the inspirational speeches delivered by Valedictorian *Dominic Fowlston* and co-Salutatorians *Haleigh*

Fisher and Adam Paliana, as well as the 30-plus graduates who earned scholarships totaling \$145,450 this year.

The "Last Marauders" are to be commended for their resilience and perseverance, completing their high school journeys in a year of big changes. Our recent graduates, as well as underclassmen, were instrumental in selecting the new SECSD nickname, Timberwolves, to help us comply with state regulations. They also endured the beginning of a major Capital Project designed to enhance our facilities, becoming the first SEHS class to graduate at Colgate as renovations to our stadium – the traditional graduation site – started in early June.

We thank Colgate University – truly a terrific neighbor – for graciously hosting our final event of the 2023-2024 school year. Special thanks to Colgate's Cody Tipton, Director of Conference Services, Summer Programs and Auxiliary Support; Jamie-Lee Broedel, Assistant Director of Conference Services, Summer Programs and Auxiliary Support; Mark Hine, Director, Classrooms, Media and Events; and the SECSD Facilities Team for helping us bring it all together.

Speaking of our Capital Project, we are in Phase II now, and stadium renovations are in full swing. Phase II will include work on the MS/HS Auditorium in the fall and continue through next summer with enhancements and improvements all over campus. If you want to keep track of the Capital Project, we'll be posting monthly updates provided by the Construction Management Team on our website as soon as they become available. Rest assured that, outside of areas under construction, students, faculty and staff will have normal access to the majority of our facilities during the Capital Project.

There always will be challenges and struggles along the way, of course, but that's where we find value in our efforts to make SECSD the best it can be for everyone. The same can be said for our Every Day Counts campaign, which has helped cut chronic absenteeism at S-E Elementary School from 32 percent to 18 percent. Massive credit goes to our administrators, faculty and staff here, and we'll continue to work together to lower that percentage even more. With the help of SECSD parents and guardians, a realistic goal of lowering our chronic absenteeism rate to 10 to 15 percent district-wide is within reach.

Please be sure to visit our website and social-media pages (Facebook and Twitter) to stay up to date on SECSD news, including the July 29 Board of Education work session regarding our student cell phone policy for the 2024-2025 school year. Faculty and staff will return to campus September 3, and school will start back up for students September 5. In the meantime, have an awesome summer!

We Are S-E... Timberwolves!

The Sherburne-Earlville Central School District Board of Education unanimously approved a motion to adopt "Timberwolves" as the district's new nickname during its regularly scheduled meeting April 16, 2024.

Effective immediately, "Timberwolves" will replace "Marauders" as the district's nickname to comply with the New York State Education Department Commissioner's Regulation Part 123, which prohibits NYS public schools from using nicknames, mascots and/or logos currently or previously associated with Indigenous peoples.

The motion, upon the recommendation of SECSD Superintendent Robert Berson, was presented to our Board of Education following new

nickname submissions and voting by Sherburne-Earlville High School and Middle School students in March 2024. Student-voting results were as follows:

S-E High School: Timberwolves 48%, Wolves 41%, Wolf Pack 11%

S-E Middle School: Timberwolves 52%, Wolves 34%, Wolf Pack 14%

SECSD's official wolf-related logos and fonts adopted during a district-wide rebranding effort in the 2021-2022 school year will remain the same, as will SECSD's "Maroon and White" school colors.

In April 2023, NYSED determined SECSD must change its nickname because of its previous association with Indigenous mascots and/or imagery. SECSD was one of approximately 60 NYS school districts directed by NYSED to comply with Regulation Part 123 by June 30, 2025.

SECSD's Board of Education adopted a resolution in July 2023 to commit to changing its nickname and held an open Community Forum in February 2024 to discuss the next steps, which included new nickname submissions and voting by SEMS and SEHS students in March 2024.

Congratulations to Public Information Specialist Dean Russin and the Sherburne-Earlville Central School District on winning two national awards and two state awards for our Facebook campaign highlighting SEES student Marshall Sepello's "Marshall Man" movie premiere in April 2023.

The campaign earned the highest awards possible in national contests

run by the National School Public Relations Association (Publications and Digital Media Excellence, June 2024) and #SocialSchool4EDU (Social Media Impact Golden Gribble, May 2024). The two national awards follow two state awards in March from the New York School Public Relations Association, social media (Excellence) and photography (Honor).

Our "Marshall Man" campaign reached nearly 170,000 people on Facebook and set SECSD page records for engagement (10,488), impressions (169K), reach (165K), reactions/likes (1,926), and shares (146). It also helped Marshall raise more than \$22,000 for other Wish Kids and contributed to the premiere setting a Make-A-Wish event attendance record of 1,700-plus.

Russin also earned three NYSPRA awards – for social media and photography – in 2023.

State honors varsity spring sports!

Congratulations to four of our varsity spring sports teams on earning Scholar-Athlete Team Awards from the New York State Public High School Athletic Association for the 2024 season!

Our baseball, softball, boys track and field, and girls track and field varsity programs all qualified for the award, which requires 75-percent of a varsity team to combine for an academic average of at least 90 during a sports season.

The NYSPHSAA also recognizes individuals as scholar-athletes for maintaining an academic average of 90 or better during a sports season. Girls track and field had 11 individuals honored, followed by boys track and field with 10, softball with nine, and baseball with seven. Four S-E golfers also earned NYSPHSAA Scholar-Athlete Individual Awards.

Additionally, The Post Standard/syracuse.com has recognized S-E senior softball pitcher *Haleigh Fisher* as a First-Team All-Central New York All-Star. *Haleigh*, who struck out 254 batters this season and led S-E into the Section III Class B Tournament, is one of 21 CNY varsity softball players on the Small School First Team.

National wrestling champ!

Congratulations to SEHS graduate *Selina Moore* on winning the 2024 women's 145-pound title during her senior year at the April 5-7 National High School Coaches Association Championships in Virginia Beach!

A two-time placewinner in the New York State Public High School Athletic Association's Girls Wrestling Invitational, *Selina* earned a national title and All-America accolades after going 5-0 at NHSCAs.

Selina opened with a 14-8 decision over 2023 New Jersey state champion Olivia Georges in the round of 32 and followed with a pin of Virginia's Ciyanna Okocha in 1 minute, 29 seconds. A 4-2 quarterfinal decision over 2024 Florida state champion Katherine Stewart set up her 13-4 major decision over 2024 Tennessee state runner-up Sally Johnson.

Selina then beat 2024 North Carolina state champion Faith Bane, 3-1, in the 145-pound national championship match. Selina struck first in the final with a two-point takedown in the first period. Each finalist scored one point on escapes for the final margin.

Local fire departments welcomed *Selina* back to Sherburne with a homecoming parade April 8, shortly after the solar eclipse.

S-E teammate *Landon Andrade*, who finished fourth at the Division II state championships this year, went 3-2 in the 285-pound weight class for junior boys. *Landon* trailed *Hunter Means*, 7-4, in his opener but pinned his West Virginia opponent with 30 seconds left to reach the round of 32. He then dropped a 7-1 decision to Missouri's Rylan Kuhn, who went on to place second overall.

In wrestlebacks, *Landon* followed a 5-0 decision over fellow New Yorker Kweku Arthur-Mensah with a 5-3 decision against Connor Reynolds of New Jersey. His run ended with a 14-5 major-decision loss to Delaware's Cael Denigris, who ended up fourth overall.



S-E winter sports make the grade!

Congratulations to S-E varsity sports programs that earned Scholar-Athlete Team Awards from the New York State Public High School Athletic Association for the 2023-2024 Winter Sports season!

To qualify for this award, 75-percent of a varsity team must combine for an academic average of at least 90 during a sports season. S-E Winter varsity programs that achieved this were girls basketball, swimming, boys indoor track and field, and girls indoor track and field.

The NYSPHSAA also recognizes individuals as scholar-athletes for maintaining an academic average of 90 or better during a sports season. Forty-one S-E varsity players earned individual NYSPHSAA Scholar-Athlete honors this winter – boys basketball (7), girls basketball (6), bowling (2), cheerleading (2), swimming (7), boys indoor track and field (6), girls indoor track and field (4), volleyball (5), and wrestling (2).

Congratulations to 1991 Sherburne-Earlville graduate Shane DuBois on his induction into the Section IV Athletics Hall of Fame on May 11!

A two-time sectional cross-country champion, DuBois had three top 10 finishes in Federation Cross Country Championship Meets, including a second as a senior to help Sherburne-Earlville's 1990 team place fourth. He also had three top-three finishes in state (intersectional) meets and helped S-E's 1989 and 1990 teams to Susquenango League, Section IV Class C-D and state Class C-D championships.

DuBois earned All-American honors from Track & Field News in 1990 and went on to compete in cross country and track and field at the University of Notre Dame.

Voters approve 2024–25 school budget

The Sherburne-Earlville Central School District thanks residents for voting to approve our proposed 2024-2025 School Budget and Capital Reserve Fund proposition, and for electing four Board of Education members May 21.

Voting results were as follows:

School Budget (passed): 158 YES, 29 NO

Capital Reserve Fund Proposition (passed): 159 YES, 28 NO

Board of Education (listed in ballot order): Debra Kurtz 150 votes, William Tyrrell Jr. 151, Ethan Johnson 149, Kerry Simmons 141.

Douglas H. Jensen educational scholarship

Douglas H. Jensen, alumni of Sherburne-Earlville Central School, has generously created a scholarship fund that will allow yearly scholarships to be awarded to two SEHS seniors who excel in math and science. The actual scholarship amount will depend on the overall cost of attendance at recipients' chosen colleges, with a maximum award of up to \$10,000 per year – renewable for up to four years.

SEHS Class of 2024 recipients of the Douglas H. Jensen Educational Scholarship were Valedictorian *Dominic Fowlston*, who will attend The Rochester Institute of Technology as a pre-med student, and *Hannah Todd-Rogers*, who will attend Keene State College in New Hampshire to study architecture.

Jensen was born in Earlville in 1937 in the depths of the Great Depression. His mother was a teacher and his father a civil engineer graduate who worked as a part-time carpenter and lumberjack and later became a managing partner at Conklin-Rogers Lumber Co. in Earlville.

Jensen attended school in Earlville. Although he was far more interested in making money, resurrecting Model Ts, hunting, and sports at the time, he still managed to graduate third in his class of 1954. A bright student, Jensen scored highly on the New York State Regents Exams and received three scholarships to attend Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. In an era when college was affordable, those scholarships, along with Jensen's work habits and frugality, allowed him to pay his way through college. He was proud to graduate with \$500 in his pocket, which he spent on a 1953 Mercury that he drove to his first assignment as an Army Ordnance Officer at Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Maryland.

Never one to suffer from lack of confidence and being eager for a little adventure, Jensen worked for a week or two to build up some gas money and then left for California with all of his worldly possessions in the back seat of the Mercury. After a scenic tour of the country, he arrived in Los Angeles in February of 1960, and pulled into a motel that advertised kitchens.

At this time, many Los Angeles employers were laying off large numbers of employees, but Jensen was hired by Pacific Pumps and rented a nice, second-story apartment with a view of the city. Jensen was quickly promoted to supervisor and spent three years at Pacific Pumps.

In 1963, President Kennedy announced the Saturn Program and the plan for the United States to go to the moon. Jensen applied for a job with Rocketdyne, the company that won the contract to build the engines for the Saturn Program, and was hired without hesitation.

Though Jensen had never taken studying very seriously, at age 25, he had matured to the point of recognizing the value of knowledge. He enrolled back into college and, over the next 40 years, worked hard to accumulate more degrees, various licenses and certifications, including a Master of Science in Mechanical Engineering, Masters in each Finance, Marketing, and Strategic Planning, a Real Estate Broker's license, a Series 7 Securities license, a California Personal Financial Planner Designation, an insurance license, and a pilot's license.

After his time with Rocketdyne, Jensen was hired by McDonnell Douglas as a project engineer to complete preparation for flight to the moon. He was in charge of all Static and Flight Testing, all reports to NASA, and all contract negotiations. Jensen moved on to a job with Aerospace Corporation as the Space Science Administrator of a newly formed organization. The corporation was formed by Congress after World War II to establish and run the space program for the government while they were learning about space and starting to develop their own cadre. The organization was the first to use the term aerospace, and was made up of 50 world class physicists, whose job it was to use their expertise to dream up ways to advance the technology. His job was to fill in the support staff and find funding for these grandiose ideas. In addition to many that were classified, some of these projects included military surveillance equipment, weather satellites, and GPS.

During his early days at Aerospace, Jensen married Earlville native Patricia Ann Resch, who worked as an educator dedicated to public education. During her career, she was principal of five Los Angeles Schools with enrollments of up to 30,000 students. She worked tirelessly with school and community organizations and participated in numerous state organizations. She died in 1999 of lung cancer.

Jensen retired at age 70 from Aerospace and spent several years running businesses he had purchased in California before moving to New Mexico, where he continues to oversee businesses and properties he owns. "Aut viam inveniam," a quote by the Carthaginian general Hannibal, translates to "I shall find a way or make one," and it defines Jensen's life and career.



Working in pairs, students followed blueprints provided by the New York State Bluebird Society to cut and assemble their houses. The trail, which includes a loop around the school pond, is a work in progress and will cover 3.4 miles.

Once complete, our middle and high school science classes will monitor the trail to collect data on the Eastern bluebird – the official bird of New York State.





Annual Notice – AHERA

In 1986, Congress passed the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA). This required schools to be inspected to identify any asbestos-containing building materials. All Sherburne-Earlville School buildings were inspected and suspected materials were sampled to be tested and rated according to condition and potential hazard.

Every three years, the Sherburne-Earlville Central School District is required to be re-inspected to determine if any known or suspected asbestos-containing building materials (ACBM) has changed and to make recommendations on managing or removing the ACBM.

The law further requires an asbestos-management plan be developed to monitor any known or suspected ACBM. The plan has several ongoing requirements: This notification letter announcing the availability of the management plans for anyone to review upon request, training of the support staff about asbestos and how to deal with it, notifying short-term workers such as sub-contractors of the locations of any known or suspected ACBM, and posting of warning signs adjacent to locations of known or suspected ACBM. The designated asbestos coordinator conducts a six-month inspection of areas of the buildings where known or suspected ACBM are located to assure they remain in good condition.

It is the intention of the Sherburne-Earlville Central School District to comply with all federal and state regulations controlling asbestos and to take whatever steps are necessary to ensure students and employees a healthy and safe environment in which to learn and work.

Annual Notice – Child Find

The Sherburne-Earlville Central School District recognizes its responsibility to provide a free and appropriate public education to eligible students with disabilities within its geographical boundaries. The District has a "child find" process that is designed to locate, identify and evaluate children with disabilities residing within its geographical boundaries, preschool through grade 12, or through age 21 if they have not received a high school diploma.

If you know a child who lives within SECSD's boundaries and attends school in the District who may be in the need of special education and/or related services, please contact the District's Director of Special Education for further information regarding the referral and evaluation process. If the student is a school-age student who attends a private school (non-public) that is not located within SECSD's geographical boundaries, the student may need to be referred to the school district in which the non-public school is located to receive services during the regular school year. Please contact that school district for information regarding time deadlines for requests for services.

The District's Child Find process extends to students with physical or mental impairments that substantially limit a major life activity. Such students may be eligible for services or accommodations pursuant to Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act. Section 504 is a Federal civil rights statute that prohibits discrimination against persons with disabilities and programs receiving Federal financial assistance. Annual Notice—DASA

Annual Notice - FERPA

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) (20 U.S.C. § 1232g; 34 CFR Part 99) is a Federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. The law applies to all schools that receive funds under an applicable program of the U.S. Department of Education.

FERPA gives parents/guardians certain rights with respect to their children's education records. These rights transfer to the student when they reach the age of 18 or attend a school beyond the high school level. Students to whom the rights have transferred are "eligible students."

Parents/guardians or eligible students have the right to inspect and review the student's education records maintained by the school. Schools are not required to provide copies of records unless, for reasons such as great distance, it is impossible for parents/guardians or eligible students to review the records. Schools may charge a fee for copies.

Parents/guardians or eligible students have the right to request that a school correct records they believe to be inaccurate or misleading. If the school decides not to amend the record, the parent/guardian or eligible student then has the right to a formal hearing. After the hearing, if the school still decides not to amend the record, the parent/guardian or eligible student has the right to place a statement with the record setting forth their view about the contested information.

Generally, schools must have written permission from the parent/ guardian or eligible student to release any information from a stu-

FERPA Rights

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents/guardians and students who are 18 years of age or older ("eligible students") certain rights with respect to the student's education records. These rights are:

- The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days after the day the Sherburne-Earlville Central School District receives a request for access. Parents/guardians or eligible students who wish to inspect their child's or their education records should submit to the Superintendent of Schools, School Principal or Guidance Counselor a written request that identifies the records they wish to inspect. The school official will make arrangements for access and notify the parent/guardian or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.
- The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent/guardian or eligible student believes are inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy rights under FERPA. Parents/guardians or eligible students who wish to ask SECSD to amend their child's or their education record should write the Superintendent of Schools, School Principal or Guidance Counselor, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it should be changed. If the school decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent/guardian or eligible student, the school will notify the parent/guardian or eligible student of the decision and of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent/guardian or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.
- The right to provide written consent before the school discloses personally identifiable information (PII) from the student's

dent's education record. However, FERPA allows schools to disclose those records, without consent, to the following parties or under the following conditions (34 CFR § 99.31):

- School officials with legitimate educational interest;
- Other schools to which a student is transferring;
- Specified officials for audit or evaluation purposes;
- Appropriate parties in connection with financial aid to a student;
- Organizations conducting certain studies for or on behalf of the school;
- · Accrediting organizations;
- To comply with a judicial order or lawfully issued subpoena;
- Appropriate officials in cases of health and safety emergencies; and
- State and local authorities, within a juvenile justice system, pursuant to specific State law.

Schools may disclose, without consent, "directory" information such as a student's name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, honors and awards, and dates of attendance. However, schools must tell parents/guardians and eligible students about directory information and allow them a reasonable amount of time to request that the school not disclose directory information about them. Schools must notify parents and eligible students annually of their rights under FERPA. The actual means of notification (special letter, inclusion in a PTA bulletin, student handbook, or newspaper article) is left to the discretion of each school.02

education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent. One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official typically includes a person employed by the school or school district as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel) or a person serving on the school board. A school official also may include a volunteer, contractor, or consultant who, while not employed by the school, performs an institutional service or function for which the school would otherwise use its own employees and who is under the direct control of the school with respect to the use and maintenance of PII from education records, such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist; a parent/guardian or student volunteering to serve on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee; or a parent/guardian, student, or other volunteer assisting another school official in performing their tasks. A school official typically has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record to fulfill their professional responsibility.

• The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by SECSD to comply with the requirements of FERPA.
