Providing a voice for our organization is now a reality. ThoughtExchange is a crowdsourcing tool that allows people to share ideas as they respond to a question posed by the district. This extends the district's ability to collaborate with groups, such as students, parents and staff. Participants are encouraged to share their thoughts and rate the thoughts of others – anonymously. Honest opinions are encouraged, and you can write as much or as little as you feel necessary.

You may also rate your thoughts about other comments: a rating of "5" means you really agree; "1" means you don't agree. Comments with higher ratings typically indicate important discussion topics. By hearing from all of you, the district will get a better idea about what's important to our school community.

ThoughtExchange, simply put, is "stakeholder engagement, simplified." This survey platform enables completely anonymous dialogue between the district and stakeholder groups, based on the stakeholders' responses to meaningful questions posed by the district. Respondents can participate on smart phones or other preferred devices. The district will provide this new way to participate because your voice is important!

Connection and collaboration of community will help to inform our direction moving forward. I hope that you will take advantage of this unique, convenient opportunity to share.

SECSD welcomes new superintendent!

The Sherburne-Earlville Board of Education proudly announced the appointment of Robert Berson as District Superintendent in May. Berson, whose appointment took effect July 1, comes to SECSD after serving as Superintendent of Schools for the Otselic Valley Central School District. He succeeds retired SECSD Superintendent Eric Schnabl, who led the District for six years.

Berson's leadership process involves a high level of teamwork combined with personal investment in the school's greatest resource: its students, staff, and community. This investment process begins with instilling belief in oneself, building trust, and demonstrating a commitment to keeping promises and fulfilling dreams. Behind this investment is respect for and belief in the value of everyone's diverse and meaningful contributions to the school community.

As Superintendent at Otselic Valley, Berson implemented a collaborative strategic planning process that helped lead the district into academic good standing. This process also helped position the district for greater success relative to social-emotional growth through support of mindfulness practices, while simultaneously building the foundational framework for implementation of a true professional learning community.

Under his leadership, OVCSD prioritized literacy initiatives such as LETRS (Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling), and professional supports for all teachers to serve and meet the literacy needs of all students. One notable outcome was a substantial increase in student achievement on year-end assessments.

Berson's collaboration and partner-ship-building with the wider OVCSD community led to successful passage of a capital project, and an award of \$400,000 from the New York State Regional Economic Development Council (REDC) 2019 Grant, helping to establish a municipal share with the Town of Georgetown benefiting both district transportation and the Town Highway Department.




During his eight-year tenure at OVCSD, Berson initially served as the Principal and Business Administrator. Prior to Otselic Valley, he served as Executive Director at Iglesia Educational Center, was co-owner of Color Me Happy Childcare, and was the Principal at Kenney Middle School for the Hannibal Central School District.

completed Berson Superintendent Development Program through the New York State Council of School Superintendents LEAF Future Superintendents Academy, The Leadership for Educational Achievement Foundation, Inc., NYSIR, and Capital Region BOCES in May 2017. He acquired his School Building and School District Leadership Certification from the State University of New York at Cortland, and his School District Administrator Certificate from New York State in 2006. He earned his Masters in Education from the State University of New York at Oswego and his Bachelor of Science in Business Administration from Houghton College in 1997.

Berson and his wife, Lisa, celebrated their 20th wedding anniversary in June. They are blessed with two amazing children, Aeden (17) and Alayna (11).

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SECSD extracurricular activities on hold

The Sherburne-Earlville Central School District has put athletics and all other extracurricular activities on pause until December, Superintendent Robert Berson announced September 21, 2020.

"We are pausing athletics and co-curricular activities to allow time and consideration for all relevant factors, such as state aid and clear guidance during the COVID-19 health crisis," said Berson, who added that all New York state school districts are facing the possibility of a 20-percent reduction in state aid this school year. "We will re-evaluate the situation in December 2020."

Should conditions prove favorable for sports to start, Berson said, SECSD would follow the condensed-seasons schedule outlined by the New York State Public High School Athletic Association. The NYSPHSAA's condensed schedule begins with Winter Sports on January 4, followed by Fall Sports Season II on March 1, and Spring Sports on April 19.

All voting took place via absentee ballots because of the COVID-19 pandemic, as per state orders.

The school will serve meals to blended students when they are on campus for in-person instruction. Pre-packaged meals will be available for both blended and virtual-only students to cover off-campus school days.

Sign up for After School Plus!

Sherburne-Earlville K-5 students in blended-learning cohorts (A and B) are eligible to attend our After School Plus program during the 2020-2021 school year.

After School Plus is a safe, adult-supervised program where your child can receive a healthy snack, enjoy indoor and outdoor activities, complete homework, or read.

The ASP runs from 3-5:30 p.m. Tuesday through Friday at S-E Elementary School (near parent pick-up entrance). Blended students may attend ASP on their specific days of in-school instruction (Cohort A Tuesdays and Thursdays; Cohort B Wednesdays and Fridays).

ASP fees are \$4 to sign in, plus \$1 per hour or any portion of an hour in attendance. The maximum charge per day is \$7, excluding a late fee of \$1 per minute for pick-ups after 5:30 p.m.

ASP will not take place if school is canceled, closed for an emergency or running on a half-day, or if after-school activities are canceled.

Sherburne-Earlville proudly welcomed in April four newcomers to its Wall of Fame, which honors graduates and staff members who have made significant contributions to humanity, improved the quality of life, or achieved noteworthy recognition in their careers or educations.

The S-E Wall of Fame's Class of 2020 featured Roy Balma, Martha Conklin, Colonel Richard Lindsay III and Matt Nakoa Pryor.

The S-E Wall of Fame has honored 48 extraordinary people since its inaugural year in 2009. Future selections will be announced during even-numbered years as S-E Wall of Fame inductions alternate with Athletic Hall of Fame ceremonies (odd-numbered years).

Roy T. Balma (1942-2001)

Roy was called "Color Guard Instructor Extraordinaire" by his former drill-team members. A 1960 graduate of Sherburne Central School, Roy was the Color Guard instructor at his alma mater (1964-1975) before heading the guard at several area schools. Roy also was active in the Mid-York Color Guard Circuit, and several of his teams won MYCGC Championship Competitions and competed throughout New York and Massachusetts, becoming Canadian Open Champions in 1967. Roy held his color guard members to the same high standards that he asked of himself: diligence, focus, and total dedication. At least eight of his former color guard members have become color guard instructors.

Martha Conklin (1931-2018)

Known as "Marti" or "Gram," Martha was a beloved physical education teacher, mentor, role model, coach, personal counselor, and friend to students for more than 30 years. A graduate of Cortland State Teachers College, Marti's career in Sherburne began in 1955. Her students were figuratively her own kids, and she taught them how to make the right choices in life and to enjoy themselves in whatever activity they chose. Her dedication and fairness earned the heartfelt respect not only of her students, but also of their parents and her colleagues. An avid runner, Marti participated in the New York City Marathon and often could be seen jogging around her family home on Chenango Lake.

Colonel Richard Lindsay III

A 1988 graduate of Sherburne-Earlville, Col. Lindsay is currently the Deputy Director/Chief Operating Officer of the Defense Health Agency's National Capital Region Medical Directorate. He has risen through the ranks quickly, including posts as the Commander/Chief Executive Officer of the U.S. Army Element at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center, and as the Chief of Staff/Chief Operating Office of the U.S. Army's 121st Combat Support Hospital/MEDDAC. Col. Lindsay earned his master's degree in Healthcare Administration from Baylor University and his bachelor's degree from SUNY Cortland. He has served in Germany, Korea, and Afghanistan, as well as in many American locations.

Matt Nakoa Pryor

A 2002 graduate of Sherburne-Earlville and 2006 graduate of Berklee College of Music, Matt is a singer, songwriter, classical pianist, and multi-instrumentalist. He has toured internationally and recorded several albums, including Light in the Dark, A Dozen Other Loves, Choreographic, and Casting Shadows. Matt was called WFUV's "Discovery of the Year" in 2014 and won the Kerrville Folk Festival's New Folk Competition that same year. He also was the "Most Wanted Artist" at the Falcon Ridge Folk Festival in 2015 and has collaborated with a variety of artists, including folk star Tom Rush and country singer Kathy Mattea.
