

SECSD WELCOMES NEW STUDENT RESOURCE OFFICER



Don't let the uniform fool you. Sergeant Ted Ellingsen is more than just an officer in the Sherburne-Earlville Central School District.

"My primary job is the physical safety of the kids at the school," Ellingsen said during his second week as S-E's School Resource Officer in early December. "It's not just being a cop in the school for security, though. It's also to work as a mentor, a role model and a counselor. I want kids in school to look beyond the badge and to come talk to me about anything."

Ellingsen brings plenty of experience to the position, which requires regular foot patrols of district grounds and daily interactions with students and staff members alike when school is in session. The 1987 South New Berlin graduate and former three-sport athlete (baseball, basketball and football) recently completed his 20th year of service with the Chenango County Sheriffs Office and jumped at the opportunity to start his retirement as part of the SECSD community.

"When I hit 20 years in May this past year, Sheriff (Ernest) Cutting approached me and asked if I wanted to become the full-time School Resource Officer at Sherburne-Earlville," said Ellingsen, who also has a military background that includes a tour in Afghanistan. "Sheriff Cutting wants to put a police officer in every school district in Chenango County, which I think is an absolutely phenomenal idea."

SECSD Superintendent Eric Schnabl said Ellingsen is the perfect fit for a district recognized on the School Administrators Association of New York State's short list of Culturally Responsible Schools this past summer.


"He's definitely a man of action," Schnabl said of Ellingsen, a firearms instructor who still teaches a basic firearms safety course in his spare time. "He's developing relationships and reaching out to kids, and I like the guy. He has a good head on his shoulders."

The feeling is mutual.

"The administration has been great and the teachers I've met, they're all very interactive with the kids," Ellingsen said. "They're interested in what the kids do, and not just how they do in school, but their mental health as well. They're very engaging with the kids. I think the staff members here have a very good feel as to what the kids are doing, and the kids are very receptive."

Ellingsen already has worked in a classroom setting, making a guest appearance during one of Jonathan Sherry's Civics classes in late November. His ability to share real-life experiences helped students gain a new perspective during their unit on understanding violence in America.

"I still think I'm doing very valuable police work and I still feel like I'm making a difference, but in a different way now," he said. "It's important to the Sheriff and to the Undersheriff (Daniel Frair) that I'm doing this, but it's important to me, too. I want to help out whatever way I can."




Thanks to everyone who helped make Sherburne-Earlville Central School District's annual Holiday Bazaar a huge success in mid-December!




2 December 21: 2018 ends with a fun-filled day



Boys Soccer Resiliency defined Marauders boys soccer season

It is a word that I heard several times throughout the course of the season from opposing coaches and soccer fans alike describing the character of this collection of young men. Character of this caliber is not something that just happens, it is a result of a long path of failure and success, hard work and patience, camaraderie and belief.

In five of its seven wins this season, this team had to come from behind to win. The same can be said of this team's only tie against an Adirondack team that had handily beaten the Marauders in their initial encounter. In a sectional game against the eventual Class B sectional and state champions, the Westhill Warriors, the Marauders gave their best display of the word resiliency, leading Westhill Coach Tom Etoll to say that ".... your boys played their hearts out!" Several Marauder soccer players earned tournament and league honors for the 2018 soccer season.

Another runner-up finish, this time at the CVA Tournament, resulted in tournament All-Star honors for **Noah Posson, Owen Rodriguez, Peter Peschel** and **Layne Sulton**.

The Center State Conference recognized **Owen Rodriguez** and **Noah Posson** as Division I All-Stars and selected **Edward Geier** and **Conor Ryan** as honorable mentions. **Owen Rodriguez** also earned Athlete of the Week accolades from *The Evening Sun* as one of the top goal scorers in Chenango County this season. Additionally, the Marauders were recognized yet again as a Scholar-Athlete Team by the Center State Conference, with a team average above a 90.

Looking ahead, S-E will bring back the bulk of its defense, led by Noah Posson, Jacob Sutherland, Gavin Zbicki, Brogan Winton and Peter Peschel. Nathan Morgan, Keegan Kane and Dan Scholl will bring experience to a depleted offensive unit as 23 of its 28 goals scored this past season will leave with the 2019 graduations of Owen Rodriguez and Edward Geier. Andrew Fern's mentorship as a playmaking center midfielder will be counted on next season as the responsibility of managing the offense will fall on his shoulders.

What is the School-Based Health Center (SBHC)?

The Sherburne-Earlville School-Based Health center is a collaboration between the school district and Bassett Healthcare Network to provide easy access for comprehensive, convenient health care to students in grades pre-K through 12 at the school. For children who already have a primary care provider (PCP), the SBHC staff will work with that provider to care for that child. For children without a PCP, the SBHC staff may become the child's primary source of care.

What services does the SBHC provide?

- Well child care: annual visits (sports or camp physicals), as recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics
- Immunizations, as recommended by the Centers for Disease Control
- Acute care: fevers, sore throats, twisted ankles, bellyaches
- Oral health care: dental exams, cleanings, sealants, fluoride treatments
- Mental health care: depression, anxiety, suicide prevention
- · Chronic disease care: asthma, obesity, ADHD
- Health Education: both during visits and through school-wide initiatives
