


Six inducted into S-E Athletic Hall

Sherburne-Earlville officially honored its Athletic Hall of Fame's Class of 2021—Basil Anagnost, John "Jake" Klockowski, David Taylor, Gerald Taylor, James Taylor and Richard Taylor—in June of 2022 as the COVID-19 health crisis postponed the district's second Induction Ceremony for a year.

Basil Anagnost: Sherburne-Earlville's Class of 1956 salutatorian earned 14 varsity letters – in baseball (4), basketball (3), football (4), and track (3). He captained the football and basketball teams during the 1955-56 school year and helped both programs to three conference championships. His senior year included a First Team allstate selection in football, his second straight conference All-Star honor in basketball, and Section IV All-Star and Babe Ruth Sportsmanship awards in baseball. Basil also was a National Honor Society member who participated in Student Council, Boys State, Chorus and Marching Band/Drum Line. He earned a full scholarship to Cornell University (Class of 1960).

John "Jake" Klockowski: The last living member of S-E's undefeated and untied football team in 1941, Jake was a three-sport athlete who graduated in 1942. He also excelled in baseball and basketball in high school before earning the WWII Victory Medal, the Good Conduct Medal and the Service Medal as a member of the U.S. Army. Jake earned a football scholarship from Hartwick College in 1947 and played one season before joining the workforce to support his family.

David Taylor: A University of Rochester Athletic Hall of Famer, David (Class of 1964) led S-E to a 17-3 basketball record and a title as league's leading scorer with nearly 20 points per game during his senior season. He went on to play for Cornell University and then transferred to Rochester, leading the latter in points and rebounds during his junior and senior college seasons. David, who also played football at S-E, won Rochester's Louis Alexander Award as a senior and played two years of basketball in Europe.

Gerald Taylor: A varsity letterman in football, basketball and track, Gerald (Class of 1956) helped S-E's football team to back-to-back league championships and a combined 14-1 record as a starting end during the 1954 and 1955 seasons. He also helped the basketball team to a 19-2 record and the league title by scoring close to 10 points per game as a senior. Gerald, who also held the school pole-vault record for several years, went on to play basketball and lacrosse at Cortland State.

James Taylor: A member of S-E's undefeated football league champions in 1958, James (Class of 1959) started as a junior and senior for both the varsity football and basketball teams. He went on to play freshman basketball at Syracuse University, where he also competed for three years as a defenseman in men's lacrosse. James has been a part of three 70-and-over national men's basketball championship teams, winning titles in 2011 (Houston), 2013 (Cleveland), and 2017 (75+ Birmingham, Alabama).

Richard Taylor: After lettering in football, basketball and baseball during his junior and senior years in high school, Richard (Class of 1952) played four football seasons at Syracuse University. He lettered in college football in 1956, when SU went 7-2 behind Professional Football Hall of Fame running back Jim Brown and finished the season ranked eighth in the country. He also lettered in lacrosse in 1957, helping top-ranked SU to a 10-0 record. Dick's high school football teams had back-to-back 7-1 campaigns (1950, 1951) and he led S-E's basketball teams to records of 14-3 in 1951 (league champs) and 13-5 in 1952.

S-E students qualify for VEX Robotics Worlds



Congratulations Sherburne-Earlville's Brayden Smith and Amon Van Alst for winning the Amaze Award during the VEX Robotics State Tournament in Syracuse on March 12. The two earned an automatic berth to the VEX World Championships in May as a result of the award, given to the team that consistently scored a large number of points at states regardless of alliance partner.

Brayden and Amon's 13460C placed seventh in state-qualifying matches with a record of 5-2, losing only to Harpursville and Lake George – two high-powered teams in the northern region of New York. They entered eliminations as the fourth seed, selected the CNS Code Miners' team 9967A as their alliance partner and defeated teams 174A (Liverpool Arctic Warriors) and 1757A (TORQ of Mexico HS), 75-46, to advance to the quarterfinals.

Although they were eliminated in the next match with a 190-139 loss to the 64040B and 64040D teams of the Lake George Warriors, Brayden and Amon qualified for the World Championships via the Amaze Award. They were one of more than 800 teams competing May 5-7 in Dallas, Texas, at the World Championships, which also featured two tournament champions, two tournament finalists, one Robot Skills Champion, two Excellence Award winners, one Design Award winner, one Innovate Award winner, and one Think Award winner from the New York tournament.

A total of 53 teams qualified for states, including three from S-E. In addition to Brayden and Amon, S-E's 13460A team of Caleb Hatton and Nicholas McDaniel placed 48th, with four narrow losses and a blowout victory, and Linkin Furlong took 50th in his command debut of the 13460B robot. Each went 1-6 overall.

Building a better campus at S-E!

The class started this project in the fall, harvesting eight larch trees from the campus property in accordance with our forest management plan. We sent the logs to Jasek's Lumber and Logging of Waterville, where the materials list for the Lean-To was sawn on a Wood Mizer mill and then brought back to campus for the rest of the work.

Structural components were built in the lab and fit together with a variety of traditional timber frame joints. Students assembled the structure June 11 near the stand of larch trees that produced the material.
